For 133 years, RNH has met the changing needs of the children, teens, families and seniors who make the Northwest Bronx their home. Through the talent and hard work of Dan Eudene, our Executive Director, and his dedicated staff, RNH touches the lives of over 5,000 people annually.

We fulfill our mission as a settlement house by serving as a vital partner in the community and by providing programs of the highest quality. For example, our early childhood center is a leader within the Bank Street Community of Learners program; our after-school program was one of only four (out of 85 total grantees) named "exemplary" by the Robert Bowne Foundation; and our signature Youth Internship Program helps teens develop job skills, explore careers in various fields, and build their confidence - all of which help them achieve future self-sufficiency.

In order to provide support for our excellent staff and our talented Executive Director, the Board of Directors has continued to work hard raising money for our Endowment Fund. In fact, we have raised more than a half million dollars in gifts and pledges. We also continue to raise money for our emergency scholarship fund, which we hope will ensure that families of all income levels have access to our high-quality programs.

Much of our success is due to the many individual donors, foundations, corporations and elected officials who so generously give us their support. We eagerly look forward to the future of RNH during the next 133 years in Riverdale.

## A Message From The Executive Director

Riverdale Neighborhood House continued to thrive during tough times, both locally and globally, during the Fiscal Year of 2005. The Tsunami of December 2004 challenged the whole world; RNH filled an important local role by helping to raise nearly \$30,000 for *Action Against Hunger*, an organization addressing immediate needs in the disaster region.

At the local level, New York City continued to compel non-profit organizations to “do more with less.” RNH was not spared from the effort’s repercussions. The most dramatic impact is that the City has changed the way it provides after school care; its new *Out of School Time* (OST) model puts some of our neediest local families at risk of losing their subsidies for childcare. To make sure no family falls between the cracks, the Board has once again provided for our emergency scholarship fund and is also looking into sliding scale fee models for the future.

The exceptional level of compassion our elected officials have for our community, coupled with the funding these legislators secure on behalf of RNH, play a crucial role in ensuring that our agency remains open and vital during times of change. We thank Congressman Eliot Engel, NYS Senators Jeffrey Klein and Eric Schneiderman, Assemblyman Jeffrey Dinowitz, Bronx Borough President Adolfo Carrion, Jr. and, of course, Councilman Oliver Koppell for their great support.

Justine Fontinell concluded her first full year as Development Director for RNH. We surpassed all previous fundraising records for our Annual Benefit and were able to respond to new opportunities for program development.

Highlights from FY 2005 include:

- Students from the Fieldston School volunteered weekly with RNH’s After School Program, as part of a school course called *Service Learning and Social Issues*. The teens led activities focusing on games as a fun way for the younger children to strengthen math and reading capabilities, analytical thinking, and social skills.
- Generous funding from organizations such as The Pinkerton Foundation, the Prospect Hill Foundation, and the Mary J. Hutchins Foundation allowed RNH to further develop our Youth Internship Program and expand its capacity to serve a greater number of teens.
- RNH’s Universal Pre-Kindergarten was recognized by the NYC Department of Education as a model program for Region One.
- A generous grant from the Russell Grinnell Memorial Trust will enable us to launch a new *Music and Movement Program* in our Early Childhood Program, in partnership with Kids Co-Motion, another well-established non-profit organization.
- The Department of Youth & Community Development awarded a Neighborhood Development Area (NDA) grant to the RNH Teen Program for youth employment services and support.

Of course, 2006 will bring even more exciting news, as we re-design our website (through a grant from the Taproot Foundation), implement new long-term strategies for RNH, and continue to grow.

## **About Riverdale Neighborhood House**

Since our founding in 1872, RNH has partnered with Riverdale residents to build and sustain a healthy and productive community. Our mission:

*Riverdale Neighborhood House provides human services and community resources in the Northwest Bronx. It responds to the needs of society and is respectful of people's differences, offering professional support and guidance to families and individuals of all ages to enable them to lead independent, productive and rewarding lives.*

RNH provides unmatched support to all sectors of the Riverdale population, strengthening the social fabric of the community and enhancing the quality of life for its residents. Many of our programs are recognized for their excellence. For example, our Early Childhood Program is recognized as a model among leading educational authorities. It is also accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) and is the only program in the community accredited by NAEYC to participate in Agency for Child Development (ACD) funding – making our Full-Time Childcare and After-School Programs affordable for all families, regardless of income.

Our Early Childhood Education programs offer a variety of options to best meet families' needs. The Universal Pre-Kindergarten is available to every child in the community. RNH's Nursery Program offers top quality care at reasonable cost to parents. Full-time Childcare allows working families to meet their professional obligations, while their children are cared for in an educational and nurturing environment. In order to accommodate parents' busy schedules, this program is offered five days a week, 51 weeks per year.

Our After-School Program provides a comfortable and supervised setting for children to relax, learn, and have fun. Literacy projects – such as poetry jam sessions – are creatively integrated throughout the program, so that the children learn to love reading and are prepared to excel in school.

Our Teen Center offers a safe place for teens to discover who they are and what they want to become. These young people acquire job skills and perform community service through our signature Youth Internship Program, which allows them to work in fields as varied as education, health care, and the environment. Teens also sharpen their literacy skills and learn artistic expression with our partners from Poets and Writers, Inc.

Our seniors can remain vital and achieve a sense of purpose through peer mentoring and support, in programs such as our Telephone Reassurance for homebound elderly. We also provide intergenerational volunteer opportunities: a number of teens work in nursing care centers, and seniors may read to children or tutor teens. All of these deepen seniors' connections to the community.

Our parents and families find the support they need to thrive. We offer parent discussion groups to young families; classes, such as Lamaze, First Aid and CPR; and drop-in childcare. RNH's Bayard Dodge Pool provides families and individuals with outdoor pool facilities, and is also a place for members of the community to gather and socialize during the hot summer months. Our sponsorship of the Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program provides the community with fresh, organic food and – at the same time – sustains farmers in New York State. The RNH Thrift Shop is completely volunteer-run; all proceeds support RNH programs, while providing a valuable service to the community.

## Early Childhood Programs

RNH continues to be one of the most respected childcare programs in the community, as well as in Region 1 of the NYC Department of Education. We offer care for children ages 2 – 5, and have designed our programs to be flexible so that they can meet the different needs of today’s parents.

Our full-time program is the only one in the area that participates in a subsidy program funded through the NYC Agency for Child Development. Through this funding, lower income parents have the opportunity to afford our high-quality childcare while they are at work or in training programs.

We serve over 130 children daily. In addition to full-time childcare, we offer a traditional nursery program, as well as free pre-kindergarten through participation in New York State’s Universal Pre-K Initiative. Our UPK received an outstanding rating in the Department of Education’s annual evaluation of the program.

Our Early Childhood program is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children, the country’s largest professional organization of early childhood educators; its accreditation is respected nationwide. This past year, through our association with the Bank Street College of Education, two of our teachers participated in the school’s mentoring program.

Also this year, we had a music teacher visit our classes twice a month, engaging the children in a host of songs and rhymes. And we expanded our nature studies to include a gardening component. Each class has the opportunity to “prepare the land” and plant with authentic gardening tools designed especially for little hands. We complemented these studies with trips to the Bronx Zoo and Wave Hill. In May, a visiting zoo of small animals visited the children in school.

We are proud of how our program continues to evolve each year, offering quality professional development to our staff and appropriate curriculum to the children.

## Family Center

The RNH Family Center enables both new and experienced parents to learn, build friendships, and get support from others who are experiencing the same extraordinary life changes. We also create opportunities for the members of our families to participate in recreational, social and volunteer activities that bring our community together. This year, the Family Center provided services to over 280 individuals and families by offering Support Discussion Groups; counseling; Drop-In Childcare; classes in Lamaze, CPR, and First Aid; referrals; and birthday parties.

The Support Discussion Groups focus on the exhilarating, but sometimes challenging, transition to parenting. Topics include postpartum emotions, feelings of isolation, and work/life balance. Our Drop-In Childcare program allows parents to have some free time, so that they may run errands or go to a doctor's appointment. RNH's Certified Social Worker provides counseling and referrals to any participants in need, from new parents to teens to seniors.

Additionally, this year we offered a series of parenting support sessions for parents of teens at John F. Kennedy High School. These sessions provided an opportunity for parents to discuss and obtain the skills and resources necessary to successfully deal with their teens.

The programs at the Family Center all serve different, important purposes. However, each addresses the changing needs and interests of families in our community, so that we may continue to nurture and support them.

## School Age Programs

The RNH After School Program has served the Riverdale community for over thirty years. Nearly seventy children, ages 5 – 12, are cared for every day from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m., as well as during many school holidays and vacations. Half of the children are able to attend through funding from New York City’s Agency for Child Development.

During this program year we established a relationship with teenaged students from the Fieldston School. These students visited RNH each week to assist the children in our After School Program in creating and developing their own games. This exciting collaboration will continue for the 2005 school year.

We continued to integrate literacy activities throughout our curriculum. Our RNH Education Interns also added another valuable dimension to the program by leading activities on a weekly basis, as well as by creating special instructive events, such as those recognizing Black History Month and Women’s History Month. Additionally, eager community volunteers offered valuable one-on-one homework help.

The summer day camp was, once again, a great success. Our program enabled the campers to make great use of RNH’s facilities, such as the swimming pool, and spend more time on organized sports with our Recreational Specialist. The curriculum also reflected a new “theme” every week, including *Happy Birthday America*, *Sportsmania Week*, and *Space Adventures*.

## The Teen Program

The RNH Teen Program supports young people as they develop the competencies and skills necessary to become healthy and responsible young adults. We provide a comprehensive youth development model that helps our young people succeed.

Our *free*, year-round, drop-in center is a safe and relaxed “second home” to approximately 200 young people ages 12-18. Mondays through Fridays, youth may choose to participate in regularly-scheduled and structured social, recreational, and educational activities, such as: job readiness training and placement, internships, career exploration workshops, and self-expression exercises.

Highlights from our 2004-2005 program year: (July 2004-June 2005)

- Generous funding from The Pinkerton Foundation assisted RNH to further strengthen and develop Year II of our enhanced Youth Internship Program (YIP). This year, Riverdale Neighborhood House successfully placed 34 teens in the following internships: environmental studies, health care, and education. The nine-month stipend-based internships offer teens opportunities to develop their job skills, and also to learn about career options. With the support of our partners, Friends of Van Cortlandt Park and Schervier Nursing Care Center, our interns developed important skills that help build the foundation for their educational and professional futures while gaining meaningful social experiences.
- As a collective year-end project, all interns in the YIP prepared a mini-carnival for the children in the RNH After-School Program. Each internship site was assigned a role in the event, from developing games to manning booths to handing out prizes. The carnival was a great success for all involved.
- Poetry remained alive and vibrant at the RNH Teen Center, through continued support from Poets & Writers and our poet in residence. Featured guest poets Rich Villar, poet performer/organizer and Anthony McCoy, of the NYC Urban Word poetry/slam competition, ignited enthusiasm among our participants. At the conclusion of the 10-week workshop, the teens eagerly created an anthology of their works.
- Youth from the RNH Teen Program demonstrated their commitment to serving those in need by holding a successful community fundraiser for the Riverdale Tsunami Fund.
- Support from United Neighborhood Houses and the Levitt Foundation enabled RNH to participate in the 2005 UNH Summer Environmental Internship Program. This funding supported the stipends for four young people, ages 15-18, and covered project-related supplies. In partnership with Friends of Van Cortlandt Park, RNH developed and managed this project, deemed “Teens for Neighborhood Trees.” Most of the interns’ work took place in Van Cortlandt Park: the teens maintained the John Muir Trail, beautified the Van Cortlandt Nature Center Garden, participated in the 2005 Street Tree Census, and maintained and restored compost sites at Van Cortlandt Park and the newly-developed site at RNH.

- As a member of the Bronx Cluster of Settlement Houses, and through the support of Congressman Eliot Engel, RNH was awarded funding from the U.S. Department of Justice/Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention. This funding is designed to coordinate services to Bronx residents and maintain partnerships among the settlement houses in the Bronx, by providing youth development and delinquency prevention services to our area's youth.
- 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Center funds allowed RNH to provide on-site services at our local schools, John F. Kennedy High School and MS/HS 141. Youth at these schools had an opportunity to participate in job readiness training, job placement and/or internships, conflict resolution training, and family life workshops.

## Senior Program

Since 1973, the **RNH Telephone Reassurance Program** has helped the homebound elderly combat isolation and loneliness, enabling them to remain at home and avoid the financial and psychological challenges that can result from having to move into a nursing home. Our trained corps of senior volunteers makes daily calls to homebound participants. For many, our phone call is the only contact they receive each day. This year, over 70 homebound seniors, ranging in age from 59 to 96, received daily phone calls from RNH. Over 98 percent of our participants are widows living alone.

Not only do our volunteer callers offer a friendly voice and a link to the outside world, but they are also trained to listen for signals indicating that the homebound participant needs additional support. This program is volunteer-driven: it depends on the hard work and enthusiasm of a corps of trained volunteers, ranging in age from 62 to 90.

Sadly, one of our dear volunteers — who recently celebrated her 90th birthday and 25 years of volunteering at RNH — passed away this spring. In her memory, we held a special ceremony, dedicating a beautiful bench and greenery on our grounds as a lasting tribute.

This year marked our 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Senior Splash. The event was a great success, with over 200 seniors attending from 14 different partner agencies. In fact, four of these agencies were new to the event. Guests arrived from several senior centers in our community, including Riverdale Senior Services, Kingsbridge Heights Community Center, St. Margaret's Senior Club, Frances Schervier Apartments, Frances Schervier Home and Hospital, St. Patrick's Home, St. Gabriel's Senior Club, the Riverdale Y, Atria, the Hebrew Institute of Riverdale and more.

The Lend-A-Hand Project is one of the extensions of our senior program, involving teens that are interested in helping seniors. Through this project, we provide useful and interesting community service opportunities for teens, create mentoring relationships that bridge the gap between the generations, and let seniors know that they are a priority to our organization.

## **Community Services**

### RNH Swimming Pool

The RNH swimming pool operates each summer, Memorial Day through Labor Day, to provide the community with a comfortable local getaway. Families, individuals, seniors, teens and children in the RNH summer camp all have access to our full-size swimming pool and outdoor recreational facilities.

### The Thrift Shop

The RNH Thrift Shop is now the only such store remaining in our community. Completely volunteer-run, it serves as a vital resource for local families to secure much-needed items and for bargain hunters to find great deals on everything from books to antiques to clothing. All proceeds from the Thrift Shop support RNH programs and services.

### Community Supported Agriculture

Originally developed by a group of RNH Board members, the Riverdale CSA provides the community with fresh, organic food. In 2005, the CSA began offering organic meat and other products during the winter months – making ours the first CSA program in New York to operate year-round.
